This proposal would mitigate ongoing damage and begin a long term path towards restoration of our once magnificent Tupelo Forrest, fresh water fish hatchery and natural nourishment of area oyster beds. Estimated to be a three year project necessitated by working along with nature, 5 jobs would be created.

Effects would be long lasting, especially since the dredging process that caused the problem has been halted. Once properly restored, the majestic beauty and bountiful river swamp would once again draw many visitors to our area.

Tupelo Honey and Apalachicola Bay Oysters have one thing in common, a silent partner that has fed them for centuries. One of the largest Tupelo Gum flats in the world, rich with nutrients that slowly make their way down river to

Apalachicola Bay Oyster beds, lies along the east bank of the Chipola Cut-Off River in the Honeyville, Dalkeith area.

For centuries this mud flat has been fed by two major tributaries, Maddox Slough and Gum Drift Slough. Their swift currents not only supplied the area with an abundance of fish and accompanying wild-life, but also carried nutrients from these muddy flats back into the river and on to Apalachicola Bay.

Over the past half century these two sloughs have been all but completely destroyed. The purpose of this project is to mitigate and actually reverse this on-going damage by restoring Maddox and Gum Drift Sloughs to their once healthy state and in the process help salvage two of our areas most prominent products. Tupelo Honey and Apalachicola Bay Oysters.

An additional feature of this project is that it will help restore the habitat and beauty of early Creek and Seminole Indian Settlements.

What white pioneer settlers found when they came through our area with General Andrew Jackson in the early 1800's, native Creek and Seminole Indians had known for centuries. To truly trace our history we must go back beyond the Old St. Joe – Iola era to a time during which the natural beauty and attractions of this area were in their purest and most beautiful – bountiful state.

After all, many of what we consider early area pioneer families inter-married and otherwise co-mingled with these native Americans resulting in a sizeable portion of our areas population being part Indian and, consequently, tracing their ancestry back accordingly.

Area “old-timers” can remember when they too were captivated by the unmatched beauty of this majestic, vibrant swamp. This, sadly is no longer the case.

Our once beautiful swamp is either dead or in some stage of dying. The dominant fish in what is left of Maddox and Gum Drift Slough is the Gar (a trash fish). While the dominant fowl is none other than the Buzzard!

Once funding is assured, it is estimated that the engineering, surveying, permitting process will take approximately one year. Once work is authorized the project should be completed in three years.

This project should be environmentally feasible in that it is designed to correct an ongoing environmental disaster. Special care will be taken to work with forces of nature in a manner that requires a minimum amount of mechanical displacement of materials.

Other sources of funding will be sought after but, in the present state of the economy, are not promising.
